Semi-Transparent Shapes:

Very often in PowerPoint you may wish to place text or another element on top of a busy background. Creating a semi-transparent shape between the background and the element is a simple and very effective way to make the element stand out. Here is how you do it.



1. Draw a shape that you will place between the background and the object you wish to separate. **Insert > Shape**



2. Send that shape backward so that it is between the two layers.

Select the shape; Format > Send Backward



3. Change the color of the shape (usually to black or white). **Select the shape; Format > Shape Fill > More Fill Colors**

4. Finally, adjust the **Transparency Slider** at the bottom of the color pop up menu. (I usually start with 30 - 50%)
